Amsterdam, Summer 1969.

Three locations, six events.

September 17, Frederiksplein, PNEUTUBE and BIG-PILLOW.

September 20, Sloterplas, WATER-TOTEMS and WATER-WALK.

September 22, Museumplein, GRASS-LOG and BRICK-HILL.

This series of events was financed jointly by the Amsterdam Arts Council and 'The Street' Foundation. The Stedelijk Museum undertook the documentation.

The scheme was not pre-publicised. The projects were intended to be addressed to those people who happened to be on the spot.

No context was desired other than the juxtaposition of the structures within the everyday routine and expectations.

Once placed on site, all the structures were given over to any process of public usage that happened to develop.

Sites chosen were all thoroughfares. At this moment, the art of real consequences is insitutangential to the ecological and environmental status-quo.

Water-totems

I metre diameter, 7 metres long, air-inflated tubes. Reinforced PVC skin printed with image of water. Ballasted with water and concrete pylons. The totems float freely and can be manipulated by swimmers. As it seems, the lake rising in columns.

Water-walk

4 metre high, air-inflated tetrahedrons.
Transparent PVC skin. A person inside can 'walk on water', progressing by revolving the balloon around himself.

Prototype for walking from England to France.

10 metres diameter, 7 metres high, air-supported cone. Reinforced PVC skin, semi-inflated, printed with brick image.
